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



studied at The Peabody Conservatory of The Johns Hopkins University. He is a classically-trained singer, having studied under Grammy-winning baritone William Sharp, and soprano Susan Solomon Beckley of Bucknell University. He was a chorister at The National Cathedral and a chorister and soloist in The Handel Choir of Baltimore for two seasons. Throughout the past decade, Jordan has performed with The Baltimore Symphony Orchestra, as well as at Carnegie Hall, the Boston Symphony Hall, and the Jackie Gleason Theatre. He has been active in the musical scene for the past decade directing, accompanying, and acting in theaters throughout Pennsylvania and Maryland. He is currently serving as Director of Music Ministries at Wesley United Methodist Church of Bloomsburg.

Shenandoah was a riverman's and then sailor's song dating from the early 1800's. It went through numerous changes and versions over the years and centuries, and still has many versions. Some lyrics refer to Shenandoah not as a river but as an Indian chief. In the standard version, the Missouri is the only river featured in the song.

Midas Turned His Child To Gold Florence March

The composer is a CPWC member who explains: "Our concert is about water. Midas Turned His Child To Gold was inspired by the ongoing protests against the Dakota Access Pipeline. The protesters called themselves 'Water Protectors' and passionately brought attention to the threat that the pipeline posed to the water sources in its path. The song builds on the Greek myth about King Midas who was thrilled that he could turn everything that he touched to gold, until he touched his own child and turned her into a statue. In the same way, there are those who are taking our most precious assets, our water, air, and land and destroying them for money. Our children's future depends on our vigilance in protecting these resources."

The roots of this African-American spiritual date back to before the Civil War but was first published in 1918 and first recorded in 1920. While the primary message is about baptism and heaven, it also referred to escape from slavery, as do many spirituals. The river was the Ohio River, a border between slave and free states. Because of its pacifist imagery. Down by the *Riverside* has also been used as an anti-war protest song, especially during the Vietnam War.

My Heart Will Go On, from the movie Titanic, is one of the world's best selling singles, and invokes admiration and disdain in equal proportions. Titanic featured the fictional characters Jack and Rose (already engaged to a rich man who gives her a beautiful jewel) who fall in love on the journey. It is a love story doomed by the depths of the Atlantic. Spoiler alert: The ship sinks. Jack dies.

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
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Come Sail Away Dennis DeYoung. Arr. by Kirby Shaw

Cups was written by A. P. Carter of the Carter Family in 1931 as When I'm Gone. The Carter Family and its various incarnations had a profound effect on folk, country, bluegrass, gospel, rock and pop music. This version appeared in the movie *Pitch Perfect* 2.
