

The Chorus thanks Cynthia Swanson, retiring President, and Mary Nancarrow, retiring Board member, for their many years of service.



When Cynthia Swanson attended her first Womyn's Chorus Spaghetti Dinner in the 1990's, little could she have known that she would serve on its board for 18 years and be its President for 12. After a year of volunteering, she joined CPWC's board in 2003.

Over the years, she and her eventual partner Mary Nancarrow used a fundraising strategy that raised hundreds of thousands of dollars for the Chorus. The strategy? "We were not afraid to try (almost) anything, and never said no to anything," Cynthia said. Whether a Valentine's Day Dinner Dance, car wash, caroling, pancake breakfast, rummage sale, raffle, staffing Dog Shows or serving food and beer at Farm Show events, Cynthia organized our talented members and friends with lots of heart.

A childhood in an Air Force family, a career in counseling and casework management and working with the Women's Theater Guild years ago honed her ability to lead a non-profit group with adaptability and good humor. Cynthia said she was thrilled to work with the Chorus because it was so good to be part of something special -- a safe place for lesbians.

This sense of belonging has provided much of her energy. Cynthia never stopped moving at any Chorus event. She has donated thousands of hours of her time, both as officer and as volunteer for virtually any task (like driving a truck!). Although no longer President, Cynthia continues to serve the Chorus in an emerita role and helps whenever needed. We deeply appreciate her dedication, leadership and the legacy she leaves us.

"I claim the title of Biggest Fan," says Mary Nancarrow, who is leaving the Board after eighteen years as non-singing member and Fundraising Co-Chair. It was the "beautiful, joyful and powerful" music that first drew Mary to the Chorus. It was commitment to the music and the mission that kept her working for the Womyn's Chorus ever since. "I've loved how the Chorus gives voice to so many women -- as feminists, lesbians, singers or audience. Every concert has given me goosebumps."

Mary has a long history of advocating for women's equality and LGBTQ+ rights. She helped get an ordinance prohibiting LGBT discrimination passed in Harrisburg in 1983 and was later president of Pennsylvania National Organization for Women.



She first volunteered with CPWC by videotaping concerts. Since joining the board in 2003, she has been called "relentless" in promoting the Womyn's Chorus. Along with Cynthia Swanson, she helped to keep the Chorus on track financially. They built a travel fund and volunteer system. They created new fundraisers and worked throughout every event (even this year's Virtual Auction, yard sale and tonight's silent auction!). Mary coordinated or wrote grant proposals and collaborated with other groups. "I am just so thankful for every volunteer, the donors, the supportive organizations and our audiences," Mary said recently. We are grateful for the thousands of hours she has given to the Chorus.

Jordan R. Markham, Artistic Director & Conductor, studied at The Peabody Conser

Conductor, studied at The Peabody Conservatory of The Johns Hopkins University and Bloomsburg University of Pennsylvania. He is a classically-trained singer, having studied under Grammy-winning baritone William Sharp and soprano Susan Solomon Beckley of Bucknell University. He was a chorister at The National Cathedral and a chorister and soloist in The Handel Choir of Baltimore. Throughout the past decade, Jordan has performed with The Baltimore Symphony Orchestra, as well as at Carnegie Hall, the Boston Symphony Hall, and the Jackie Gleason Theatre. He has been active in the musical scene for the past decade directing, accompanying, and acting in theaters throughout Pennsylvania and Maryland. He is currently serving as Director of Music & Organist at St Stephen's Episcopal Cathedral in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania.

Tyler A. Canonico, Collaborative Pianist, is hailed as "one of east coast's finest young concert organists and inspiring church musicians. Tyler is the Minister of Music and Organist at Market Square Presbyterian Church in downtown Harrisburg, Pennsylvania. In addition to his work, he is the organist for the Harrisburg Symphony Orchestra, a co-founding member of Allegro con Fuoco, serves on the American Guild of Organists' national committee for Pipe Organ Encounters, and is the Sub Dean for the Harrisburg AGO Chapter. His education includes a Master of Music in organ performance from the University of Alabama and a Bachelor of Arts in organ performance and sacred music from Lebanon Valley College. Tyler is exclusively represented by Concert Artists Cooperative.





Dr. Erik Forst, percussionist, is the Director of Percussion Studies at Messiah College, where he oversees all aspects of the Percussion Area. He maintains a healthy performing schedule as a soloist and clinician both nationally and internationally. Dr. Forst is also in demand as a Percussionist and Timpanist throughout the East Coast, most recently being appointed the Principal Timpanist with the Gettysburg Chamber Orchestra in 2018. He is a clinician and performer for several percussion companies. An ardent supporter of new music, Dr. Forst has been involved in the commissioning of several new works. He performed with CPWC at its 2021 Spring Concert. Welcome back, Erik.
